Potential of Farmers' WhatsApp Group in Popularizing Vrikshayurved-based Kunapjal

The work on the popularization of Vrikshayurved-based Herbal Kunapjal was started in the Kumaon hills of Uttarakhand in November 2019 with the formation of a WhatsApp group "Vrikshayurved in UK Hills" in November 2019. The group consisted of farmers, who had attended the Vrikshayurved Workshop in Pantnagar, 23-24 October 2019, scientific staff of GBPUA&T KVKs, NGOs, and the officials of the Dept of Agriculture and Organic Board of Uttarakhand government. It was through this WhatsApp group that farmers, NGOs and others learnt how to prepare Vrikshayurved's Herbal Kunapjal and successfully used it in different crops that they grow. The group encouraged interaction among farmers and share their experiences with the use of Kunapjal, and proved very useful in communicating with the farmers and other members during the COVID-19 period from March till October 2020. 
A New WhatsApp Formed for the Farmers of West UP and Tarai of Uttarakhand and UP

After realizing the success of the Uttarakhand WhatsApp group, AAHF started another WhatsApp group for the farmers of West UP and the Tarai of Uttarakhand, named "Vrikshayurved se atmnirbhar kisan" beginning August of 2020. The objective was to educate the farmers on the advantages of Herbal Kunapjal in field crops such as sugarcane, rice and wheat. The group with 123 members has enabled educate farmers on how to prepare the Herbal Kunapjal and use it in different crops and popularize it among farmers, and encourage exchange of information on aspects related to farming of different crops. Successful use of Herbal Kunapjal in Peaches

Farmer Sri Pramod Gunwant of village Simrad of Ramgarh block in Nainital district enhanced the production of peaches by the use of Herbal Kunapjal in 2020. Sri Pramod had 50 peach trees in his farm which were not yielding much fruits due to the leaf curl disease. After preparing the Herbal Kunapjal in November 2019, he applied it to his peach plants after pruning as soil drench and also as sprays in December 2019. In the spring of 2020 he observed good and healthy growth in his peach trees.





harvested a bumper peach crop (about 12 quintals) from these tress with good quality peach fruits (Fig) (Sri Pramod Gunwant, Simrad, Nainital; Mob.: 6398226224).

Use of Herbal Kunapjal by Uttarakhand Farmers

Herbal Kunapjal has been popularised by AAHF in Nainital, Almora and Champawat districts of Uttarakhand since November 2019. Farmers first learnt how to prepare it and used then it in their different crops. The preparation method was described on the WhatsApp group "Vrikshayurved for UK Hills" and also guidance provided on how to use it. Thanks to cooperation of KVK-Jeolikote and Lohaghat, ATMA and NGO (Maya Negi-Kotabagh) some preparation demonstrations were organised for the farmers. As a result, now about 10 farmers are already preparing Herbal Kunapjal and using their in different vegetable, field and fruit crops that they grow. This is in spite of the COVID-19 period during which we have not been able to visit the farmers. Other farmers especially those who grow apples and other temperate fruits are being encouraged to use Herbal Kunapjal through drench application and foliar sprays after pruning in December.

Use of Clerodendrum infortunatum fermented solution for die-back disease of tea bushes

Die-back disease is a serious disease of tea in the Assam and Darjeeling and Dooars areas of West Bengal. It affects roots, stem and shoots of the tea bushes. Dieback starts from bottom and moves up slowly killing the entire plant. It is affecting more





areas due to global warming with every passing year. Work done in some tea gardens under the technical guidance of AAHF showed that a fermented solution of Clerodendrum infortunatum (known as Bhat or Hill glory bower) in cow urine was found highly effective in controlling the die-back disease. The Clerodendrum solution is made by taking 40 kg of finely chopped or crushed leaf material and mixing it with 100 l of cow urine in 200 l plastic drum and adding water to fill the drum. The material is fermented for 7 days after which it is filtered and used. The solution is applied either as spray (200 l/ha) or soil drench (500 l/ha). It is also now recommended by the Tea Research Association (TRA) to control this serious disease of tea, and about 60% of the tea gardens are now using it to manage the dieback disease. Uttarakhand Declares 10 Blocks as Organic

The Uttarakhand government in an attempt to make the state as organic in due course of time declared 10 block as organic, where no chemical fertilizers and pesticides are allowed to be used against diseases and insect-pests. Among these Blocks, one, Betalghat



falls in Nainital district. Having realized this, AAHF with the help of ATO Sri Gopal Krishna Joshi ji, Uttarakhand Jaivik Utpad Parishad, Nainital Unit and Sri Narendra Pilakhwal ji of Bank of Baroda, Garampani, was able to organize farmer training on a Herbal Kunapjal on 25 September 2020. The trainer in this course was a Herbal Kunapjal enthusiast and progressive farmer, Sri Pramod Gunwant of Simrad village of Ramgarh Block, Nainital district. He provided training to the farmers of Block on the preparation and use of Herbal Kunapjal in their crops. One interesting part of this training course was that most of the participants were women farmers. With this, Sri Gunwant becomes our first Farmer trainer on Herbal Kunapjal. Congratulations to the organizers and the new Kunapjal trainer Sri Pramod Gunwant (Mob.: 6398226224). Well done!

Vrikshayurveda Krishipadashala (Pathshala)

Kerala Chapter of Asian Agri-History Foundation (KC–AAHF) has initiated Vrikshayurveda Krishipadashala at Kottiyoor Panchayath of Kannur district during the year 2019. This is Kerala's first Vrikshayurveda Krishipadashala recognized and supported by Department of Agriculture, Government of Kerala.

Vrikshayurveda farmers of Kottiyoor Panchayath, Sri Sony Mathew and Sri Rajesh are entrusted with the responsibility to manage Vrikshayurveda



Krishipadashala by KC–AAHF. Total area comprises of 14 acres of leased land which includes a large water storage structure for irrigation and another for aquaculture. Almost all vegetables including sweet potato, winter season vegetables, paddy, tapioca, etc. are grown following Vrikshayurveda-based farming system. This farm also has demonstration plot on open precision farming and fertigation with herbal Kunapjal. Cow urine pesticide prepared in copper vessel is used to manage sucking pests of vegetable and paddy.

Farmers from Kottiyoor panchayath and other Panchayaths of Kannur district visit this farm for learning Vrikshayurvedabased farming system.



Sri Sony Mathew and Sri Rajesh are also marketing the Vrikshayurveda produce of this farm and also produce of other Vrikshayurveda farmers of Kottiyoor Panchayath under the brand name "Kannur



Vrikshayurveda" in eco-shops and urban street markets of Department of Agriculture in Kannur district.

A New Farmers' Producer Organization (FPO) for Organic Kiwi

More and more farmers are now opting for organic farming of different crops. As we all know, farmers are facing the problem in marketing of the organic produce.



One solution to this problem is formation of framers' producer group or FPO, which is also being encouraged by the government. One such FPO has been formed by 167 kiwi producing farmers of Shama and Ana of Bageshwar in Uttarakhand, which is called Katyurghati Himalayan Organic Kiwi and Herb Farmer Producer Company Limited, which is registered in the Company Act. It is managed by the member farmers and is managing to sell the kiwis directly to exporters. The member farmers in the group also share techniques and experiences of growing kiwi and the machinery with one another. They grow organic kiwis which are recently certified by the UK Certification & Inspection Limited (www.ukcertifications.org.uk).

This Katyurghati FPO is also running a Kiwi Orchard-cum-Training Center in village Ana. They have demonstrated the harvesting and packaging of kiwi fruits. Congratulations to the Katyurghati FPO. (Sri Rajneesh, Katyurghati FPO, Ana, Bageshwar, Uttarakhand; Mob.: 8171398042).

Posana vidhi, Drumaraksa, Taru Chikitsa, Upavanakriya, Nivasa sanna taru, Subhasubha Laksana, Taru Mahima and Citrikarana, in various documents. Contemporary agricultural practices of the selection of soil, successful cultivation of trees, harvesting and processing of the produce became known that were based on agricultural principles followed by our ancient agriculturists (Rishis). It was through these practices that they had evolved sustainable agricultural management practices in South and Southwest Asia that could sustain agriculture for several millennia. Numerous such practices together with the first organic and fermented biofertilizer, Kunapjal, are very well explained in the book Vrikshayurved by Surpal (c. 1000 CE).
